myself, in the winter time, one rock at a time. If you want to have a successful garden it has to be accessible to children. If you don't give it to children, they can get angry and be destructive, so what I did was build these paths so they can walk and run through the place. They come here and play tag. Sometimes they destroy a plant or two, but you replace it and you keep going. If you come this way [along the center path] you can see the lovely petunias and marigolds. Here [along the front fence] is a row of corn with Chinese hibiscus. You see, when you walk in here, no matter where you walk, you'll be surrounded by flowers, fruits or vegetables. Here are mulberry bushes, cherry trees, apple, nectarine, peach, and pear trees. We don't use no chemicals in this place, everything is organic. Here are miniature roses. I took those from the front of Mayor Giuliani's house.

GG You mean Gracie Mansion!

HP Right, I rescued it from Giuliani's domain. I just clipped a little piece and put it here, and look at the beauty of it. So if you want a rose bush you know where to go get one. And these are my favorite, Gladiolas. They'll bloom deep red and pink, red, pink, red, pink, all the way down the path.

GG Herran, because we can't possibly describe with words the richness and beauty of this garden, let me proceed to some other questions. What impact will the recent transfer of Green Thumb Leases to HPD have?

HP We're in danger here of disappearing. Now at any time HPD can come here and build their buildings. Giuliani and developers have joined forces for the purpose of profit making and they do not take us and our families into consideration. They couldn't care less! That angers me. And they plan to build houses that we cannot afford. The houses are not for the people who live within the community. They're going to bring people from all over.

GG What do you think it will take to safeguard this and our other community gardens?

HP I think we're going to have to hit the street, like we did in the 60s, and create a ruckus. An atmosphere of rebellion, because you cannot sit down and talk to people who will not listen. Sitting down to talk doesn't seem to have gotten us anywhere except further back. It's going to have to be a loud, vociferous, energetic movement.

GG Is there anything else you'd like to add?

HP . The most important message I have for the gardeners is: please open the gardens, open them up! Open them up to everybody, mainly to children! Do not exclude anybody! And I mean anybody. Because the gardens should cater to the community. And that's everybody. That's the only way these gardens are going to succeed, if we don't open them, the community itself will close them down!
